Message from the Executive Committee



Many of the accomplishments of the year will be highlighted throughout this report, but some principal areas of achievement in 2024 - 2025 are noted below:

- 1. The ongoing work for the Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) project including the addition of Dr. Colette Mesher, Project Manager. Thinking forward to the end of this project, Colette applied to two funding streams with focus on climate change and helped establish the Fund Development Committee.
- 2. The continued inclusion of the Mi'kmaq Language into website and social media products when possible.
- 3. Collaboration with the Unama'ki Institute of Natural Resources' Climate Change team.
- 4. Changes to the Canadian Biosphere Regions Association's governance structure with Stan Johnson appointed as the Atlantic region's representative on the CBRA Board of Directors.
- 5. BLBRA's summer intern, Keagan Parris, conducted a preliminary audit and inspection of the signage around the Biosphere in 2024-2025. This will guide some of the work later in the year.

Along with these accomplishments, the Board has continued to address issues related to financial administration of the BLBRA. The first step was hiring the financial services of B. Taylor who worked with the Finance Committee and ECCC project team to support the bookkeeping throughout the year and engaging in a financial review with Grant Thornton.

The Board now feels that all gaps have been rectified moving into 2025 - 2026. Workplans and budgets for 2025-2026 have been developed with Bras d'Or Watch, Explore the Bras d'Or and the ECCC project being the immediate focus.

Finally, much appreciation to all the Directors, Committee Chairs and members, volunteers and staff for their amazing work in the Biosphere.


Strategic Pillars







Additionally, partnerships and collaborations have taken place with Eskasoni Fish & Wildlife Commission, ACAP Cape Breton, and many more local organizations. The Trails, Communication and Community Engagement and Learning Committees play an important role in ensuring that this goal is addressed.

The BLBRA has worked with CBU and NSCC to develop education and learning opportunities as well as marketing studies. NSCC holds an ex-officio position on the BLBRA Board of Directors. CBU Capstone studies and their World Tourism Institute are well aligned with our objectives. We look forward to current and future meaningful partnerships and collaborations with CBU and NSCC.







Discussions about data storage for monitoring and related data have been held with CBU and will continue.


Environmental Stewardship

As a learning place for sustainable development the BLBRA was actively involved in sharing local information directly with stakeholders and via its website, newsletter and new media.

We searched out best practices as a member of the The World Network of Mountain Biosphere Reserves (WNMBR) and plan to join the World Network of Island and Coastal Biosphere Reserves (WNICBR) and look at addressing coastal erosion issues among other concerns.

We participated in regular meetings with the Atlantic Region Biospheres and the Canadian Biosphere Regions Association (CBRA) to discuss leveraging the network and activities of the 19 member sites, fostering interconnected communities dedicated to sustainability and biodiversity conservation.

Other SDG Efforts



As can be seen, through the BLBRA committees., partners and ECCC project work, we have been contributing to a variety of sustainable development goals, addressing not only the sustainability of our biosphere, but goals that contribute to the betterment of society and the economy. More examples are described below.



We and our partners at EXP, CEPI, Dalhousie, ECCC, EFWC and others have individually and combined looked at our mountain Water Towers through ongoing hydrology studies to evaluate and ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all. We and CEPI continue to support efforts to divert wastewater from the Bras d'Or. There is also zero tolerance for the dumping of sewage from pleasure boats into the Bras d'Or.

In addition to sharing quarterly synopsis of weather insights from Jonathan Buffett of the Cape Breton Mesonet, we have engaged Dalhousie through the ECCC grant to do a report on Climate Change Impacts on Ground Water Recharge in a Low-Mountain Area. This specifically looks at the impacts of climate change on the Christmas Brook watershed's groundwater resources. The work specifically aims to quantify how groundwater resources will change in a warmer future with less snow and more rain.





Our fulltime and term staffing, summer student hiring and volunteer engagement practices, along with our educational resources developed by the Community Engagement & Learning Committee (CEAL) committee, have provided us with many opportunities to provide a wide range of impactful learning for both young and old across many demographics.

Our staffing, summer student hiring practices and volunteer engagement are non-discriminatory and are fully committed to achieving gender equity, 'leaving no one behind', whether in education, science, technology, safety, peace or inclusiveness. We thus empower all women and girls and those of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

Community Engagement & Learning Committee (CEAL)

CEAL is made up of about 8 active members who are working hard to increase awareness and understanding of the Bras d'Or Lake Biosphere through a variety of activities and offerings. The learning opportunities include interactive facilitations of teaching kits in the local schools, citizen science opportunities to monitor a variety of parameters around the lake using testing kits, hands-on explorations for all ages at the Bras d'Or Watch events, and distribution of information through social media and website, just to name a few. The following numbers indicate the impact that the committee has had in 2024-2025





- Information was shared and interactive learnings offered with over 25 people at the BLBRA Expo in Baddeck.
- 8 people joined foresters to walk the Nicholson Trail
- 57 local species cards were developed by ACAP and rolled out over 29 weeks on social media and on the website to encourage readers to start a collection and learn more.
- 7 reviews were posted from our first Adventure Lab in **Battery Park**
- 600 or more learners experienced the workshops at schools and camps
- 100 or more people participated among 4 Bras d'Or Watch events
- Kirsty Lock Water monitoring kits piloted and 5 distributed to volunteer citizen scientists to take monthly measurements at select Biosphere locations.

Communication Committee

The communications committee was busy pushing our new branding and message of environmental stewardship, sustainability economic development and community engagement through new media, our website (7,000 annual visits), 4 newsletters and 9 bulletins (average 700 subscribers, 51% opens), local events, tradeshows and tourism conferences.

In the Fall we had a booth at the The Unama'ki - Cape Breton Island Tourism Summit - an event for all tourism operators, industry leaders and partners. Our emphasis was on being an UNESCO ecotourism destination.

We later attended a Destination Cape Breton's Sustainable Tourism Plan - Engagement Session in Port Hawkesbury where we spoke of the Atlantic Tourism Corridor project with Destination Canada and our complementary emphasis on sustainable social, environmental, economic and cultural environments in the Bras d'Or Lake Biosphere Region.

As a member of the Canadian Biosphere Regions Association (CBRA) Communication Community of Practice (COMCop) we participate in regular online meetings sharing approaches to promotion and impactful initiatives where feasible.

We continue supporting and promoting our Explore the Bras d'Or initiative with CEPI and Ocean's North to encourage all to to take in the local experiences around the lake during summer in the ever expanding calendar of events.

The Membership Committee was available for membership recruitment at the Biosphere Expo on June 9, as well as the special meeting on June 13 and the rescheduled AGM September 12, 2024.

We closed out the year with 144 total members; 104 lifetime and 40 annual. This was a slight decrease from 2023-24, where we recorded 46 annual members.

This year, the membership committee experimented with different forms of member recruitment: social media versus in-person. We have concluded that in-person recruitment is far more successful than online. Our most consistent membership sign-ups were generated from the Expo event in Baddeck and the Association's AGM.

Fund Development Committee

The Fund Development Committee was convened in early 2025. We met to discuss goals and options for how to secure long term funding as well as project based funding.



There are several different types of funding we are considering. One is shorter term, fixed time funding that are linked with a specific project that can range from 6 months to 5 years. Endowment or donor centered funds are more sustainable but harder to secure. There is also a possibility of securing long term government funds at the municipal, provincial or federal levesls

Support from the communication committee as well as relationship development with fund raising experts are being undertaken to explore all fundraising options.




Theme 1: Governance and Management

A team member has attended all Indigenous Protected and Conserved Areas (IPCA) committee meetings with research knowledge shared. The Eskasoni Watershed Protection Committee brings together technical experts and project partners to discuss the results of this project and to build upon the bigger scope of biodiversity conservation through watershed protection.



Board meetings were organized and attended to keep the BOD informed of the project as work progressed. Presentations and updates have ensured that there has been an increased awareness about the project among the Biosphere Board, partners and stakeholders.

Theme 2:

Research (hydrological monitoring)

Results from Reid Dauphinee's MSc showed that the wetlands and the area surrounding the wells are of highest conservation priority for groundwater recharge and streamflow generation.

The groundwater flow model from Reid Dauphinee's thesis was completed and showed that streamflow infiltration contributes 60% of pumping well water, while the local recharge into the fractured rock around the wells accounted for the remaining 40%. The wetland model being developed by Julia Gillette includes snow depth projections and groundwater recharge but needs further calibration, with forest and well models still to be developed.



The team has submitted a paper for publication (Hydrological Processes) based off of Reid's work and is currently under external review.

EFWC land and fishery guardians, Species at Risk and IPCA staff participated in knowledge transfer and learning opportunities during field work excursions with traditional knowledge and western science working side by side.







Theme 3:

Documentation and prioritization



The Project Manager gathered information from First Nations organizations and other sources to better identify priority areas. Key indicators identified by First Nations include cultural significance, threats due to climate change, habitat degradation and invasive species.

Mi'kmaw youth have been involved in data collection and monitoring as well to ensure that a Two-eyed Seeing Approach is applied to the fieldwork for this project.









Virtual communications through social media and newsletters were used to communicate with a wide audience. The BLBRA partnered with ACAP-CB to highlight species within the Biosphere. Expanded use of teaching kits and continued organization of events like Bras d'Or Watch and Explore the Bras d'Or also helped to raise awareness about biodiversity within the Biosphere. A summer intern was able to gain knowledge about the Biosphere and Canada's efforts to conserve and protect biodiversity for years to come.

Theme 4:Knowledge Transfer

The theme of the CBRA National Gathering (September 16 – 19, 2024) was Biodiversity Blueprint: Achieving Biodiversity Targets through Biosphere Regions. The National Gathering took place in the Waterton Biosphere Region (Alberta) located in the territory of the Siksikaitsitapi (Blackfoot Confederacy), including the Kainai and Piikani Nations, and within Treaty 7 Territory.





We learned about ecosystems and biodiversity in the region as well as learned about projects taking place in the area. Each biosphere was given a chance to provide an update along with Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) and CCUNESCO. Sessions on biodiversity, Indigenous engagement and Indigenous-led conservation also took place. BLBRA Board member, Stan Johnson, gave a talk about conservation and Indigenous Language. Stan has also recently agreed to be the CBRA Atlantic Region representative on the CBRA Board of Directors.


